CHAKRAPANI COMMITTEE'S SUGGESTIONS

> Conducting only one a month per subject

> Introducing grading system in Intermedi colleges

WHAT'S THE WAY FORWARD

> Govt should get down to nuts and bolts of the problem to address it

> Teachers should be trained on coaching students with compassion

PRESSURE OF PERFECTION?

One student commits suicide every 55 minutes in India

> In academic year 2017-18, more than 150 students across AP and Telangana committed suicide

> In Hyderabad, more than 30 students committed suicide in academic year 2017-18

20% of city students in a single class are suffering from anxiety & depression

> Suicide incidence rate per 1,00,000 population for those below the age of 14 is 0.5

> Suicide incidence rate per 1,00,000 population for those in 14-17 age bracket is 9.52

WARNING SIGNS

> Isolation from family and friends

Self-harm

> Drastic changes in mood and behaviour (extreme fear, sadness, irritability)

> Changes in sleeping and eating habits

> Drug and alcohol use

> Engaging in risky behaviours

> Showing less interest in activities they previously enjoyed

According to statistics, over the past three years more than 26,000 students have committed suicide across India. A majority of student suicides are caused by underlying psychiatric factors such as stress, depression and anxiety. It could result from difficulty in coping with academics, unrealistic expectations and pressure from parents and lack of support from peers. It is very important to identify the illness at an early stage and consult a mental health professional

SORRY MOTHER, READ THE NOTE

> Calm atmosphere should be provided to students to study

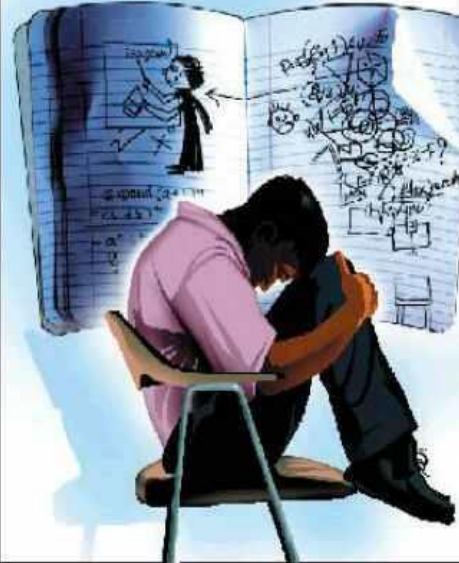
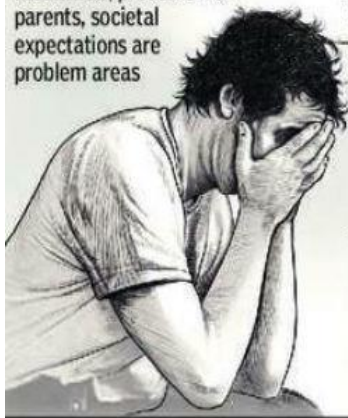

“UNEMPLOYABILITY” A BIGGER PROBLEM THAN UNEMPLOYMENT

Poor English, comp skills make grads unemployable

The National Employability Report by Aspiring Minds revealed this, based on a computer adaptive test on 60,000 Indian grads

Of the five million odd graduates that India produces annually, only a little over half are employable in any sector of the knowledge economy. Inadequate English and computer skills are key factors holding back students, especially those from smaller towns.

The National Employability Report by Aspiring Minds, an employability solutions company, revealed this, based on the computer adaptive test on 60,000 Indian graduates. The students were tested communication skills in English, computer knowledge, analytical, cognitive skills and basic accounting knowledge.

According to the report, employability is highest in the bigger Tier I cities (over 25 lakh population). The drop in employability is maximum for jobs of analysts and corporate communication, all jobs that require high competence in cognitive skills and English.

It was found that the higher the skill requirement for a job, the greater the gap between employability in Tier I compared with Tier II and III cities.

Tier III cities (less than five lakh population) seem worst off when it comes to exposure to computers, while in English both Tier II and Tier III need help.

When it comes to a drop in skills from Tier II to Tier III cities, it is noticeable that the drop in cognitive skills is the highest among management

respectively. These require communication, cognitive skills and personality traits such as friendliness and agreeableness and in the latter numerical ability too.

Over one third of the graduates (36%) were suitable for employment in clerical/secretarial jobs, the sector showing highest employability for graduates, followed by IT-enabled services and BPO. These show 21.4% employability as they require relatively low skills.

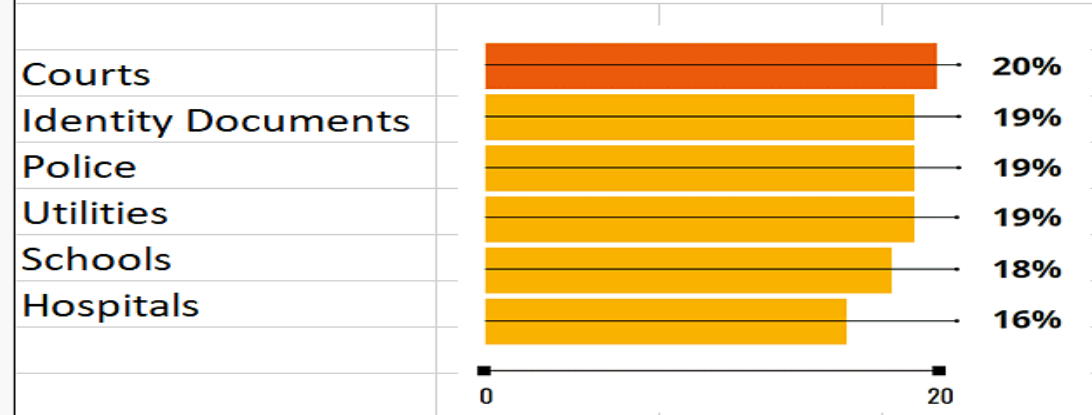

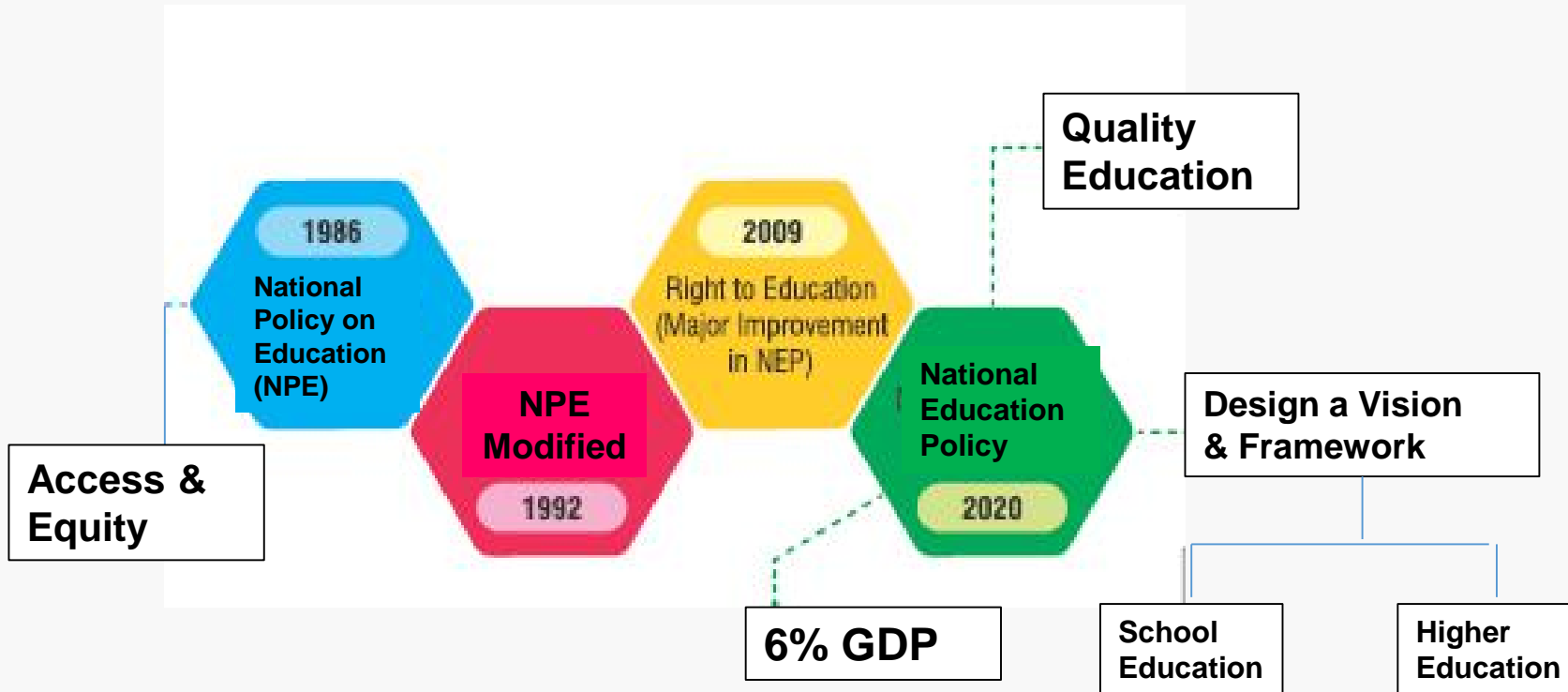

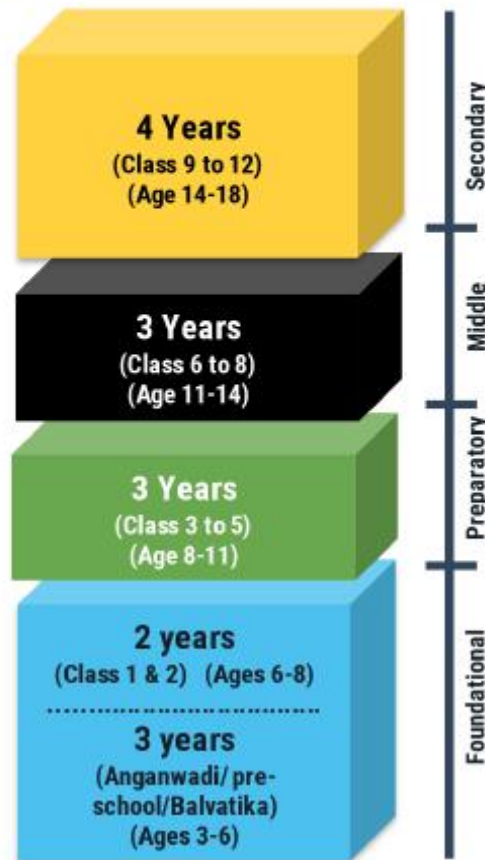

Existing Academic Structure



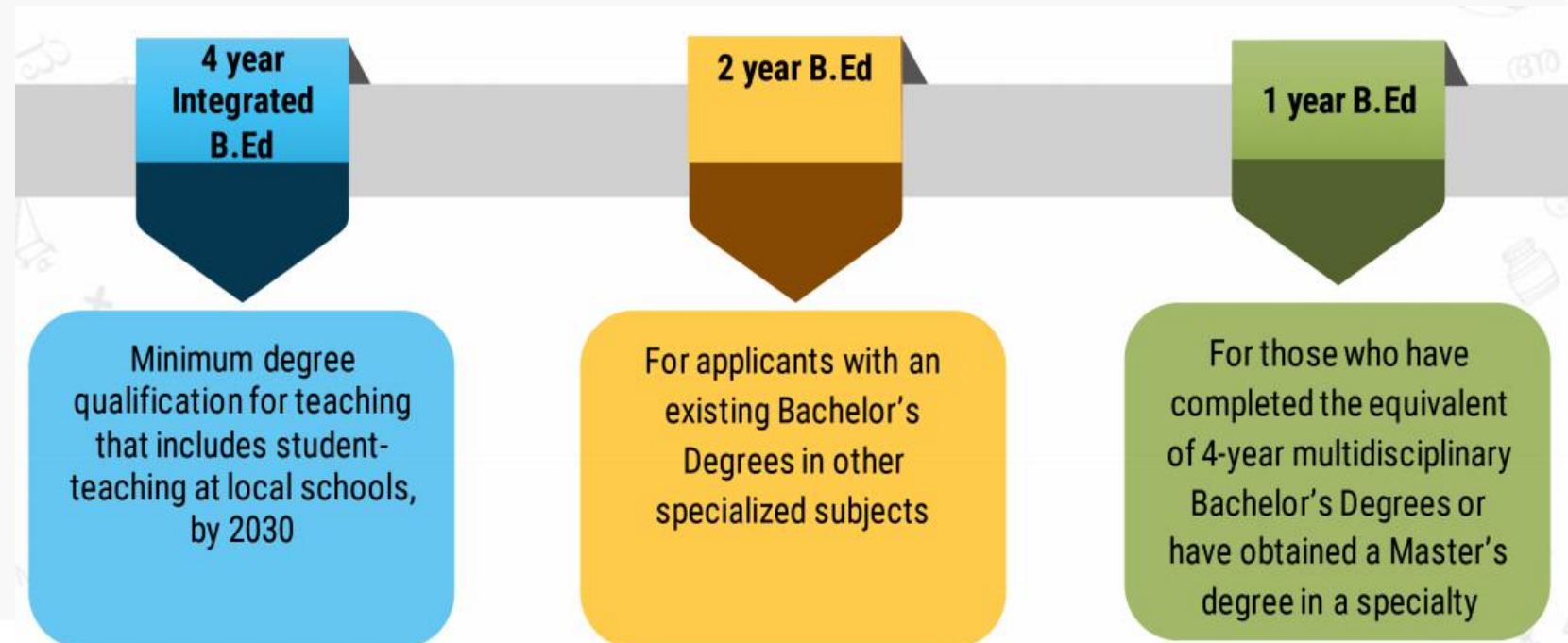

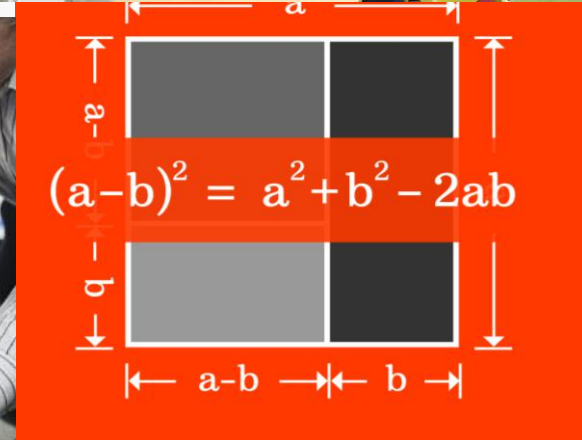

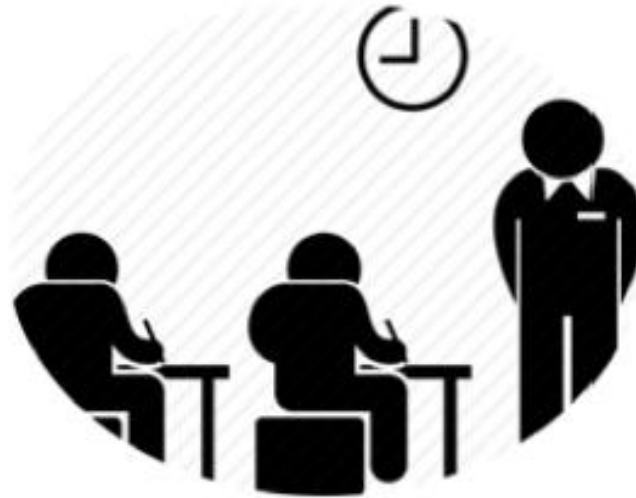
